Get students to set their own goals, with your help



Use SMART (specific, measurable, attainable, results-oriented and time-bound) goals



Break larger goals into specific steps



Focus on mastery goals





Manage behaviour positively and proactively



Take time to enjoy and get to know your students



Include student interests in learning activities



Show trust by giving students responsibility for their learning



Show interest in students' achievements







Change the groupings at least once a month



Allow students to choose their own activities from a range of options



Minimise differentiation between high-achievers and low-achievers



Provide a variety of attainment levels in each activity
