Bullying

Bullying can be physical, verbal, social and relational, or electronic (cyberbullying).

It's important for centres to have a clear and shared definition of bullying.

essential characteristics of bullying

Behaviour is mean and harmful

Behaviour is repeated, persistent and ongoing



Behaviour is deliberately intended to cause harm, fear, or distress

There is a perceived or real power imbalance between perpetrator and victim

NOTE: not all aggressive or harmful behaviour is considered bullying

Steps teachers can take to prevent bullying



Build a deep understanding of the children you work with



Teach children about feelings and prosocial behaviour



Set a positive example



Establish a safe environment and promote inclusion and acceptance throughout the whole centre



Take children's requests for help seriously and intervene immediately

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
